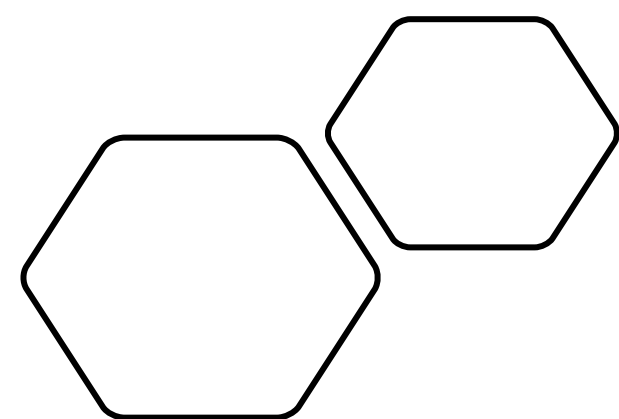

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The scene presented by community of bees is the more astonishing, the more we become acquainted with its details.
